Tree and Shrub Descriptions

Pine – Norway Red: Most versatile conifer for the area. Grows over 35 ft. Rapid growing tree with 4" to 6" long, glossy-green needles. Does well in sandy, dry soil.

Pine – White: Grows over 35 ft. Vigorous growing, tree with long, soft bluish-green needles. Tolerates shade and prefers sandy loam soil.

Spruce – Norway: Grows over 35 ft. Fastest growing spruce with dark green needles and draping branches. Good ornamental or windbreak tree. Grows well in most conditions.

Spruce – White: Moderate growing tree with bluish-green needles and short, dense branches. A popular Christmas tree as well as an ornamental and windbreak tree. Endures drought conditions well.

Cranberry – American Highbush: Attractive foliage turns red and orange in the fall. Flat clusters of white flowers are followed by red berries. Grows to 8 feet.

Remember that these trees grow well in our sandy soil, but you will have to protect them from deer damage.
